Outcomes to Date:

Full-Day Pre-K:

- A Tangelo Park model replication began at Lockhart Elementary School.
- Discussions are underway with funders for a comprehensive project in the Parramore area.



Licensed Nurses:

- Positions at 15 schools receive support and funding.
- Positions at 11 schools are funded for three years.
- A community health center with a nurse practitioner opened at Edgewater High School, serving students at **seven schools**.
- Discussions are underway with major healthcare providers to identify a comprehensive solution that will provide a continuum of care rather than episodic care for all students.



Literacy Tutoring:

ALL students at 10 Title I schools will have access to personalized reading software.



Read2Succeed and Middle School Morning **Book Clubs:**

- Read2Succeed:
 - can utilize work-study college students as tutors at no cost; 0
 - launched a first grade program; and
 - served 46.6% more students this year.
- Middle School Morning Book Club groups increased by 25% this year.




Access to STEM:

- 125 kindergarten teachers received training and materials for "Bridge to
- An "Engineering Our Future" pilot program has begun at Castle Creek Elementary School.
- The "Hello Florida Field Trip Fund" has been established to assist low-income
- Physical science teachers at 20 middle schools received training.
- Biology teachers at all 19 high schools received professional development.



City Year Orlando:

- Programs at **five** schools are **thriving**:
- Of the students who started 2012-13 off-track in English Language Arts and were tutored by City Year Orlando, 71.6% finished the year on track, earning a C or better.
- Of the students who started 2012-13 off-track in Math and were tutored by City Year Orlando, **73.8% finished** the year **on track**, earning a C or better.





A new team began their work at Catalina Elementary School, completing a critical feeder pattern.

Suspension Centers:

- Two new Suspension centers will open in fall 2014: Bithlo Community Park and J.R. Smith Community Center.
- Over time, our new partnerships with Orange County government and the City of Orlando will provide 11 sites for new centers – five more than are needed to meet our goal.
